Activities for Home

General park information

Seven Bends State Park provides public access to the North Fork of the Shenandoah River. The park features two hand-carry boat launches, picnic areas, one single family-sized picnic shelter, vault restrooms and 8 miles of hiking trails.

The park provides water and land based outdoor recreational and educational opportunities while protecting and interpreting the spectacular scenic view shed and geological, natural and historical resources of the storied seven bends area.

Conservation at Seven Bends State Park

- Stay on the trail
- Take or download a trail map and know where you are going
- Do not try to feed or touch wild animals
- Leave plants and flowers in the wild (this includes mushrooms and berries too)
- Pick up after your dog and keep them on a 6 foot leash
- Throw your trash in a park trash can or throw it away when you get home
- Only start a fire in designated places, like grills

A good rule to remember is... take only pictures and leave only footprints.

Conservation at Home

- Chose sustainable fishing options
- Save water when you can consider using a rain barrel
- Reduce, reuse or recycle products in your home
- Avoid one time use plastics
- Follow rules and laws that are set in place to help the environment
- Use sustainable and ethical hunting practices
- Help pollinators by not using insecticides
- Encourage others to help conserve
